Recently, a new dress code policy was proposed for the 2023-2024 school year for the Dunmore School District. The purpose of this new policy is to ensure that students are dressed appropriately for learning, to further enhance the classroom dynamic, and to ensure the safety of the district as a whole. Many concerned students and guardians attended the school board meeting on May 5th to offer their thoughts on the matter. Giulietta Escobar and Cecelia Amico, the upcoming president and vice president of the class of 2024, presented a petition that addressed concerns about future uniforms. The petition mentioned many points, such as how uniforms conflict with self-expression and individuality, and how the dress code appears to be geared toward female students. They suggested that a dress code similar to the one that we already have be thoroughly enforced, proposing the allowance of clothing like sweatpants and leggings. Another student in 6th grade explained that when the relaxed dress code was implemented, his grades actually

increased. Many worried parents also brought up concerns that they have about the proposed dress code. One parent brought up the financial burden of



dress codes, as one uniform can cost around \$100. Another parent mentioned that she had been bullied in her youth due to the lack of brand names on her uniforms. Another point that was mentioned by a guardian was a possible issue concerning children with sensory issues. She claimed that these children perform better in softer materials, and uncomfortable uniforms can cause children to fidget and become distracted, increasing behavioral issues. Overall, there has been a lot of debate over this proposed policy. The school board decided to think the matter over and vote on it at the next meeting. Whatever the outcome, a lot of thought and concern was put into it, and everyone brought valid reasoning. The passion brought forth by students, guardians, and administrators was extremely admirable, and is sure to pay off!
