A massive congratulations to the volleyball team and its outstanding season. Your victories do not go unrecognized!

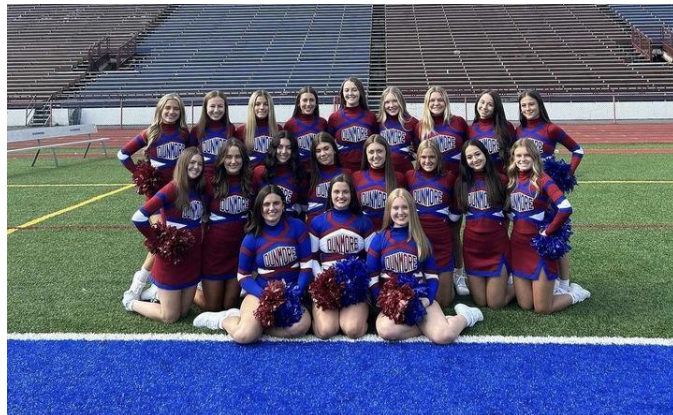


Girls Tennis
